Faith in the Nexus Animation for Parents.

Our animation is ready and has a guide, Exploring Faith in the Nexus to accompany it.

The animation recognises that all children have a spiritual life that drives them to seek meaning and purpose in life. Often in this search, children turn to their parents with big questions about things such as the origin of life, the existence of God, and life after death.

We acknowledge that being confronted with such questions can be daunting for parents and can leave them feeling inadequate to offer a response. Thus, our main message through the animation is one of reassurance and encouragement.

Parents are in a unique position to stand alongside their child and explore with them. To just "be" with your child, to share the journey of discovery and curiosity with them is powerful and offers an experience that will encourage your child to be spiritually curious, setting the foundations for them to grow stronger in their spiritual life.

This month we are showcasing online the available Nexus resources developed from the research findings. These include a short animation with a PDF guide for parents. Kieran O'Brien, the director of Ministory, will be joining us. Kieran has been working alongside NICER to create a range of animations and storytelling resources to help promote the findings of our Nexus research. In addition to creating animations, he also specialises in storytelling training and spirituality and has worked on many videos, reflections and educational resources related to the Christian faith.

Faith in the Nexus Podcasts.

Four podcasts that focus on exploring Children's spiritually in a Christian context are currently in production and will be disseminated through the NICER website in July and through the next academic year. The podcasts consist of a conversation between Dr Ann Casson, Nick Taunt and Kieran O'Brien who explore the thinking behind the animation that accompanies the main Nexus report, (Faith In The Nexus (nicer.org.uk)). Their conversation also enters into a wider debate about the nature of children's spiritual development within the Christian faith tradition.

The first episode explores what do we mean by spirituality. We reflect on an understanding of children as spiritual beings that underlies our research.

In the second, we look at how we can help children's spirituality flourish. We reflect on the different ways adults interpret their role and consider the value of exploring alongside - shoulder to shoulder.

The third podcast explores how we nurture children's spirituality in today's world. We consider how adults can enable children to seek meaning from a place of confidence.

The final episode explores spirituality and storytelling. It takes a different approach to the previous podcasts. We explain why we use storytelling animation to illustrate Nexus research findings.

Faith in the Nexus: A Catholic Context.

Our last meeting focused on the Nexus and the Domestic Church, and what we can do to support the family in the transmission of faith. During this meeting we shared our animation for parents, and we were delighted to welcome Margaret Wickware (Catechist focused on parent-led catechesis, Bayswater parish, Westminster Diocese), Martha Flavell (Open the Book Training and Development Officer-Northeast) and Ronni Lamont (Author of Faith in Children (2020)), who each contributed their invaluable ideas and views on effectively supporting the Domestic Church.

Recent Seminars

Let's Talk about Death (Presented on 8th June 2021)

Death is inevitable, but is often hidden away, talked about in whispers. Finding the language to talk with children about death is challenging, whether in the home or in school environment. It's often easier to assume that children are not ready nor interested in learning about death, than to proactively prepare oneself to explore the issue together.

In this seminar discussion Dr Sabina Hulbert presents empirical evidence supporting the claim that primary school children are indeed expecting parents and carers to engage in these conversations when they return home from school. It was a first-class event bringing together diocesan directors of education, church leaders of children's ministry and academics interested in the research area of children's spirituality.

Who are the Occasional Belongers?

This recent seminar led by Dr Ann Casson draws upon some key findings from the Faith in the Nexus report that considers the diversity of expression and understanding associated with a sense of belonging and connection.

The main Nexus report found that where a strong, active relationship between church and school was perceived, then there was more evidence of faith-related activities at home.

In this seminar, Dr Ann Casson considers:

- The different ways in which people belong to church.
- The value individuals place on this connection with church.
- Different in kind, not strength of belonging.
- The importance of recognising where people are and acknowledging that perhaps for many that is where they want to stay.

This Faith in the Nexus seminar explores the role that headteachers play in shaping a church school culture that allows for spiritual growth in children and facilitates children's exploration of faith in the home. Ursula Eisl shares her findings from an analysis of the head teachers use of language to portray their school's role in facilitating the children's exploration of faith. How such language is framed and communicated is vital for church school leaders. The data reveals considerable variation in the language that church school headteachers employ to express their vision for a school culture that fosters growth and helps promote a community of inclusivity.


It is planned to continue the Nexus seminar series in the next academic year 2021-2022. Here are some dates for your diaries:



The Nexus Research Evaluation Project (a funded initiative) is an opportunity to share the Nexus resources and further develop a network of practitioners, build a picture of best practice, and support school, church, and home to help pupils develop a flourishing resilient spiritual life.

THIS PROJECT OFFERS SCHOOLS

- A strategic framework and concrete activities, which can help everyone in school explore how spiritual well-being supports mental health and resilience.
- A one-year structured CPD (Continuing Professional Development) opportunity to identify spiritual practice activities that best support the flourishing of a child's spiritual life.
 - For Staff: Help to reflect on their own spiritual needs in the safe and supportive network of the project community.
 - For pupils: The opportunity to talk openly about when they feel most comfortable asking 'difficult' questions and trial different approaches to developing faith and spiritual life.
 - For Parents: A chance to try out different approaches such as the 'standing shoulder to shoulder' approach that encourages them to listen and explore together.
 - For other key stakeholders in school such as governors, local church community: An opportunity to explore their contribution to the spiritual wellbeing of the local community.

- An opportunity to become a member of the NICER research community collaborating with researchers in identifying and sharing best practices in Christian education and informing future NICER research projects.

What is the Faith in the Nexus?

The 'Faith in the Nexus' research used the word 'nexus' to mean the connections between home, church school and the local church community. We researched how church primary schools, working with churches and other key groups, helped children explore faith in the home. It involved 20 church primary schools, a cross-section of Anglican and Catholic schools. We interviewed 187 pupils and 267 adults (parents, staff, local clergy, and other interested key groups), and 1002 people completed an online survey - 730 pupils and 272 adults. https://nicer.org.uk/faith-in-the-nexus
